Headteacher's Introduction:

As we come to the end of 2024 I wanted to provide a reflective update on a year of changes, fun and success.

Back in September, we welcomed our new Year 7 and 12 cohorts. In Year 12, it was great to see the return of so many familiar faces and brilliant to welcome a large number of new students from other local schools. Over the last term, it's been lovely to see how well both year groups have settled and adapted to their new learning environments.



In 2024, my two main areas of focus have been to improve the Sixth Form facilities that Christleton has to offer and to improve the school's IT systems. The building work that took place over the summer term and throughout the summer holidays has allowed the creation of a brand new, secure common room and silent study facilities for Sixth Form students. Both of these have been a great addition to the school and are making a real positive difference to the students.





The transition to a new IT system is now also complete, and we hope that you are finding School Synergy an improvement on the previous application. Parents now have the ability to message school and track homework, amongst many other things, which many have reported as a huge improvement. It is worth mentioning that there are still a large number of parents who have not yet registered for the app. It is vital that you do this in order to gain the most upto-date information and communications regarding your child. Going forward, this will also be the only way to access your child's KASH reports which are essential for monitoring their progress. If you are yet to register for the app and are unsure how, please contact our Data Officer, Sherburn.



As you know, road safety in and around Christleton is of huge importance to the whole school community. I receive emails of concern, regarding local roads, on a daily basis and appreciate every single one. I am in regular contact with the local and Parish Councils and pass all requests and ideas onto them regularly and I hope to see some physical improvements in the spring. In the meantime, please be mindful when travelling throughout Christleton and on other local roads and, where possible, try your best to reduce traffic around school by dropping off and collecting a little further away from the school gates and village centre.

In a bid to increase student input in day to day school events, we have recently appointed a Student Leadership Team of Head Students, Deputy Head Students and Prefects. Their first meeting will be held this week which will allow them to plan their work for the year ahead. Special mentions must go to Scarlett Kinmont and Ruth Evans, who both became Head Students, and also Abigail Maclaren and Amy Catton who were appointed Deputy Head Students.

A big focus for the next year will be to further improve our already impressive fundraising activities. Just last week Miss Anderson sent 57 shoe boxes as part of our Christmas appeal and back in July, Year 12 raised a fantastic £5,496.04 through the last day student activities. This money has been divided between CATH (Chester Aid to the Homeless) and Cancer Research UK. Based on this year's success, I can't wait to see what ideas the time have for 2025.



During the past term we have organised a series of parent and carer engagement events, including a Meet the Headteacher evening, Year 10, Year 7 and Year 8 and 9 information evenings – with a Year 11 information evening to follow in the New Year.



The aim of these events is to invite parents and carers in to school for the opportunity to find out what is happening, refresh their knowledge on e-safety and provide them with the opportunity to ask questions of key members of staff. The feedback from these events has been very positive and it's something we plan to continue each school year.

We had a record number of visitors to our Post-16 Open Evening in November. It was fantastic to show off our new Sixth Form facilities for the first time and for our students to demonstrate the amazing things they do in their 360 Futures sessions and the enrichment curriculum. Applications to join Sixth Form in September 2025 close in January and if you would like further information please contact Mrs Brown.

Finally, some hugely positive news is that we have no staff leaving Christleton this Christmas which gives the school great stability. As you can see, 2024 as a whole has been a very busy year with many changes that are already bringing huge school improvement and we can't wait to see how things evolve in 2025.

Thank you to all parents and carers for the support that you have given your children and the school this year. Wishing you all a Merry Christmas, a Happy New Year and a restful break.

Curriculum Information Evenings

to school this term to attend our series of Key Stage 3 and 4 Curriculum Information Evenings. Covering all areas from school updates, key curriculum information, reporting timelines, KASH, e-safety and Head of Year presentations, the evenings are a part of our plan to help further improve communication between school and families. Autumn Term Assemblies

This month I have really enjoyed delivering assemblies to Years 7-13. I chose the theme 'Marginal Gains'. This was inspired by the book 'Atomic Habits', by James Clear, the work of Dave Brailsford (Team Sky), and by our school focus on helping students to be better learners.

Some studies show that to develop a level of proficiency (e.g. mastering how to play the guitar or learning how to perform a move on the trampoline, or whatever your preferred skill might be!), it can take up to 10000 hours of practice! However, the quality of our practice is what counts. I shared with students the idea of 'perfect practice'... if practice makes permanent, then we need to form habits that mean we are practising perfectly! The idea of critically analysing our practice led us to the 'Aggregation of Marginal Gains Theory'. That is, small yet significant improvements can lead to monumental results. I asked students to think about how they can apply this theory to their learning. Here are just some examples we looked at in the assembly:

- Stop using your phone half an hour before bedtime and read instead.
- · Go to bed half an hour earlier.
- Replace less healthy snacks with fruit when you can.
- Create a quiet space for revision (or revise in a quiet space in school).
- Write down a couple of targets arising from revision or learning in class to focus on at home or ask for help with.
- Have a daily routine for revision using effective techniques (e.g. 5 minute flashcard test followed by 10 minutes of self-quizzing).
- Finish homework two nights before the deadline to allow time for checking.

When considering small changes that can lead to monumental results, I reminded students of our expectations in relation to Homework (more below). Minor adjustments to our approach, completion levels or engagement can lead to truly remarkable results!

Homework

I seized the opportunity in assembly to remind students of the changes we have made to homework, and its purpose; to reinforce classroom learning and to develop learning habits for future academic success. Please have a look at the following page for our homework expectations.

To serve as a reminder, Year 7 students currently follow a structured homework timetable to support task distribution and prepare for future studies. After Christmas, students in Year 7 will start to receive regular homework across all subject areas, in addition to revision tasks. More information regarding this will be shared with Year 7 families before the end of term.


Key Stage 3 students should expect to complete 30-45 minutes of homework daily, while Key Stage 4 students will spend 60-75 minutes completing homework. Sixth Form students will adhere to our '60 for 60' learning approach. Further details will be available shortly via our updated Homework website page.


Learning Habits

This term I have worked with our new school Learning Habits Lead, Mrs Brown, to continue to lead a school Revision Revolution! Working with the author of Revision Revolution, Helen Howell, we are making good progress in this area. Here are just some examples of the impact of our work

- Year 13 Learning Habits lessons featured a modelled Pomodoro Technique approach. All students applied their brain dump, self-quizzing and flashcard skills during a timed pomodoro!
- Year 11 Mock Exams it was phenomenal to see how Year 11 approached their mock exams and to see the practical implementation of the use of flashcards in their preparations. The Year 11 canteen was filled with the buzz of revision prior to afternoon exams!

- Year 10 Design Technology students sharing their use of homework to develop flashcards, enhance their recall and production of a flashcard holder in lessons!
- Key Stage 3 students have been developing their recall of key terms and words in MFL
- Maths students in Year 12 have been using Cornell Notes to consolidate their knowledge of statistical key terms.
- Year 7 students have used revision jotters and flashcards to revise for their upcoming ICT assessment on 'Outputs/Inputs'.

Amplifying Youth Voices: Amy Catton's Inspiring Journey at the Labour Party Conference

On 22nd September, I got the opportunity to speak at the annual Labour Party conference held in Liverpool with over 22,000 attendees over the three days, making it the largest political conference in Europe. Over the last few months I have been helping to build an app that helps alleviate climate anxiety in a fun and engaging way that shows the impact that young people can make regarding climate change.



The For Planet app gives you small eco-friendly tasks to complete that earn you points to use to build a virtual forest and then shows you the CO2, water and energy you have saved over a year. Getting to talk about the impact that the For Planet team has already had on young people and hopes for the future was really impactful.

I sat on a 45 minute panel interview with Kate Green (Deputy Mayor of Greater Manchester and ex-shadow minister), Luciana Berger (Ex-shadow minister) and James Robertson (CEO of Bee Well) talking about young people's mental and physical health. I got to share my work in the sector, what I believe needs to be done within the new government and as the only young person on the panel, share key insights of what I have experienced in the education system. I was also invited to speak on a podcast by the Walton youth and community project about the importance of youth voice.

Connecting with MPs, councillors and organisations was such an amazing opportunity as well as seeing the publicity of other issues affecting young people. So excited to see where my activism journey takes me next

Year 10 BTEC Business Students Visit The Ice Cream Farm

Year 10 BTEC Business students enjoyed a trip to The Ice Cream Farm. The visit began with an informative presentation about the farm's development since its acquisition by the Fell family in 1986. Students learned how the introduction of Milk Quotas led the Fells to add value to excess milk produced by their dairy cows, identifying a gap in the market for 'Real Dairy Ice Cream.'

A chance visitor, the boss of Air2000, loved the ice cream so much that he placed a £2 million order for his employees. This investment enabled the business to expand its production facilities and secure contracts with major supermarkets, including Iceland.

Students toured the farm's attractions, including Europe's largest indoor sand play area and the new Escape Rooms, even trying to break out of the prison escape room. The visit ended with a trip to the ice cream parlour, where students picked from over 50 flavours of award-winning Cheshire Farm ice cream. (Toffee fudge is highly recommended!)

Careers - Year 11 Post 16 Morning

As part of our careers programme at Christleton High School, a Post-16 Morning ran on the 6th November. This was a day designed to help pupils make important decisions about their next step following GCSEs. The day involved a number of presentations from outside Post 16 providers including:

- · Cheshire College
- · ASK Apprenticeships
- · BTEC in Protective Services based at QPHS
- · Reaseheath College

Students were given information about options available to them following their GCSE's and gained an understanding of what each pathway offers. This also gave them an opportunity to ask important questions about their future.


This was an invaluable experience for all involved and students were mature in their response to the presentations they were involved in.

Science Bronze CREST Award - My Experience Kaniha Sathiskumar 9BY1

In small groups, we were investigating "Making Perfect Bath Bombs" for the Science Bronze CREST Award.

My aim was to investigate how the amount of fizz changes while using a specific ratio for the ingredients.

First, we had to do careful planning: researching how to make a bath bomb, choosing the ingredients, and any extras (such as scents, rose petals, and coloured dyes). We were given essential chemicals and equipment to use, but we could bring in any extras.





After all the preparation, we set off to create and use bath bombs. These sessions took place every week after school in Mrs Woolley's Science lab.

My partner and I learned one of the most important things in science: mistakes are okay and help us learn. We came across things like adding too much citric acid in the making process, which can make the bath bomb fizz too early. For example, one time the bath bomb mixture started bubbling and rising in the beaker before even being dropped into water! This is why we learned to measure our ingredients carefully and think about ratios of the chemicals.

We were very successful, and we did make a perfect bath bomb. When you drop a bath bomb into water, it dissolves nicely (it was very satisfying). There is a neutralisation reaction between the sodium hydrogen carbonate and the citric acid. Carbon dioxide is produced in the reaction, and the carbon dioxide forms bubbles in the water, rushing to the surface with a very satisfying fizz.

Throughout this project, we had to keep a record of our research, our results, and our conclusion. Plus, in an evaluation, we discussed how the project could be improved further. These write-ups were then marked to assess if we had passed the Science Bronze CREST Award, and I am very pleased to say that all of the students were successful and passed. We received our certificates in assembly.

Overall, I enjoyed doing this experiment as I learned some new things and had fun collaborating with others.




