Headteacher's Introduction:

Welcome to the February edition of The Swan. As usual, we are packed with news from the past half term and information about up and coming events.

I have been working with the CHSA to agree a project where parents and carers can raise money to support the school. We originally agreed to raise money for covered outdoor seating areas but the costs are very prohibitive. We may return to this project in the future but have decided to focus our current efforts on an area where we need urgent help - raising £20,000 towards the refurbishment of two Chemistry laboratories. The school successfully bid for £100,000 of funding from the Wolfson Foundation to refurbish the laboratories but part of the agreement is that we raise £20,000 to support the project.

As you will see from the photograph, the laboratories are very old and in urgent need refurbishment. Our CHSA volunteers work very hard to fundraise at events and support the school throughout the year.



This year's school production will be Billy Elliot and rehearsals well underway. We first performed Billy Elliot at Christleton nine years ago and Ben Rackham, who was in Year 7 at the time, played Billy in that production. Ben is now in his final year of a Musical Theatre degree at Chichester.



The 2025 production will feature just over 100 cast members and two boys have been cast as Billy, Nye Egan-Simon in Year 8 and Charlie Lewis in Year 7. Grace Monaghan has been cast as Mrs Wilkinson, the ballet teacher.

The whole cast is working hard on learning lines, songs and movement, all ready for the opening night. The show will feature a purpose-built stage set with a video wall, and the music will be played live by a nine-piece band. There will be three days of sound and lighting installation to get the set ready. We have more than thirty students helping in technical, backstage and front of house roles, working with over three hundred props and one thousand separate costume items.

Deputy Headteacher Update Curriculum & Achievement

Curriculum Information Evenings

This half-term, we've had the pleasure of welcoming many families into school through a variety of curriculum-related events. We kicked off with the Year 9 Options Afternoon, where Mrs. Sweet and Mrs. Blackwell guided students and families as they explored potential course options for Key Stage 4. It was fantastic to see so many students engaging with new subjects and thoughtfully considering their next steps. A big thank you to all teaching staff, students, and families who contributed to making this event such a success!

Later in January, we launched our inaugural Year 11 Information and Wellbeing Evening, led by Mrs. Dennan and Mrs. Blackwell. The evening focused on supporting students in staying happy, healthy, and calm as they prepare for their upcoming exams. Parents had the opportunity to attend a range of informative sessions, including mindfulness practices, strategies for supporting children in developing effective study habits at home, yoga sessions, and much more!

Homework

Homework continues to be a priority across all areas of the school. This half term I have really enjoyed meeting with students across all year groups to further explore and improve the use of homework to support student progress and learning habits.

We highly value student feedback, and recently, students shared insightful suggestions regarding homework. Their feedback focused on making it easier to access homework tasks, better managing workloads over a fortnight, the duration of tasks, and the regularity of assignments. This valuable input has been shared with staff as part of our ongoing efforts to ensure that homework is effective and manageable for all students.

To serve as a reminder, Key Stage 3 students should expect to complete 30-45 minutes of homework daily, while Key Stage 4 students will spend 60-75 minutes completing homework. Sixth Form students will adhere to our '60 for 60' learning approach. For more information, please see our new Homework page on the Christleton High School Webpage.

Teaching and Learning

Following the Christmas break, staff in school have used dedicated CPD sessions to explore the use of disciplinary literacy. Led by Literacy Lead, Mrs Allan, and Head of English, Miss Wimbush, this work complements the use of Sparx Reader to work towards our whole school Literacy and Reading priority.

Celebrating Success

This academic year we've sought to increase opportunities to celebrate success. You may have noticed a greater presence on social media which is a deliberate move to shout about the wonderful achievements and opportunities that happen day to day in school. It's so lovely to be able to wish students well as they head off to the latest netball or football match and to see a hall full of students engaging in a literacy session. One of the nicest sounds is hearing the piano coming from the Hall after a student has requested to bob in there and practice. I realise that I have the luxury of seeing your children in situations you don't; it's a real highlight of my role.

Enrichment Passports

This term we will be introducing enrichment passports for the students. Mrs Stoker will be rolling these out in through Form groups. These passports will stay with students as they progress through school and will be used to record achievements and milestones. These will encourage the students to engage with extra-curricular activities, sporting and musical events and promote the importance of being a good citizen both inside and outside school.

Behaviour and Intervention

Another area in the planning as we head towards Easter is drop down days for Years 7-10. We are fortunate to have Behaviour support staff with a wealth of experience in writing programmes of intervention including the Respect Programme which was rolled out nationally. Utilising resources provided by organisations such as Show Racism the Red Card, Mrs Baxter and Mr Turner are creating new programmes to help our students navigate their way through peer relationships. Areas of focus will be acceptable use of language and antibullying. These sessions will complement our PSHCE and Form Time lessons.



Mobile Phones

I can't end without once again mentioning mobile phones! I was astounded to hear on the BBC news that a study had concluded that taking phones away from children at school does not positively impact their results. I cannot disagree more. What are we seeing? Young people talking, young people playing, young people not being distracted in lessons, a reduction in online incidents, a reduction in peer on peer issues that previously escalated due to messaging at school. Will results improve? It's too early to tell – but I can wholeheartedly say that focus in the classroom and overall behaviour has improved. Maybe we should let the BBC know!


What is the SSLT?

As a team we prepared a form-time information presentation, looking at the theme 'for a better future'. We explored the ways that the Holocaust remembered around the world as remembering people's stories. We placed lots of emphasis on the importance of sharing untold stories of those who didn't get to share their own.



Alongside this, we celebrated the Chinese New Year, with this year being the year of the snake. Verity created a Chinese New Year information pack which dived into the history behind the celebration and the ways the cultural traditions are recognised around the world.



In Year 7 lessons we also launched a local history poster competition. Students were tasked with researching a local castle such as Chester or Chirk and to sell it in poster form. The creativity we have seen in the posters is wonderful and the level of research is very impressive! Year 12 Literacy Workshop with the Royal Literary Fund

On Wednesday, 5th February, Year 12 students had the fantastic opportunity to spend the day off timetable, working with a team of professional writers to enhance their literacy skills. Following the positive feedback from previous visits, we were thrilled to welcome the Royal Literary Fund back into school for another engaging and insightful workshop.

The Royal Literary Fund's Bridge programme helps students develop their writing skills and prepares them for the challenges of academic writing at university, college, or work. Students worked alongside Bridge Fellows—professional writers who have worked with hundreds of schools across the UK. The Fellows provided valuable techniques to help students write clearly and confidently in all contexts.

We were delighted to host a team of distinguished writers, including:

- James Friel An award-winning writer of fiction and dramatist for BBC Radio.
- Paul Adams Author of the Max Cassidy Trilogy and numerous novels for adults.
- Susan Elliot Wright Novelist and writer of health-related non-fiction and magazine features.
- Lizzie Nunnery Acclaimed playwright and singer-songwriter, known for her work on historical and migrant experiences.
- Chris Simms Author of multiple awardwinning crime novels and psychological thrillers.
- Mark Morris Writer of over thirty books, including horror stories and works in the Doctor Who range.
- Zoe Howe Author focusing on music, culture, and the occult, with a special emphasis on women in the arts.
- Marnie Riches Author of the George McKenzie crime thriller series.

Students shared their positive feedback after the event, noting improvements in their writing abilities. Some of the key takeaways included:

- Confidence in writing clear, well-structured paragraphs.
- Enhanced skills in analysing and discussing evidence

What our students said:

"I now know how to assess a question or title and so can structure my essays better. Also how to use evidence but also how analyse and discuss it further. I learnt to read the work aloud too."

"I now know how to structure, edit and add insight and evidence to my paragraphs."

"It now feels just easier – especially topic sentences. I just know more now."

"I'm going to stop going off at tangents and really understand what the title is asking."

"I'm going to take time to look at my paragraphs and how they are structured. I think in the end this will actually save time when I write."

We were immensely privileged to work with such talented writers and grateful to the Royal Literary Fund for supporting the event.

We're hoping that students will be able to use what they learnt on the day to improve their writing ability whether that is in academic essays, their EPQ, personal statements, presentations or letters of application in the future.

What Art Do You Do?




Match Funding



Thanks must go to all the students and parents for their commitment and the volunteer staff without who, the award and expedition section would not be possible.


























