Headteacher's Introduction:

We have reached late Spring and the weather has such a big impact on student wellbeing. It is lovely to see the students sitting out together on the field enjoying the sunshine. The warmer and longer days have led to a flurry of Duke of Edinburgh visits with all students attending practice expeditions. This would not be possible without the dedication of our volunteers. We have the largest number of students taking the Dukes of Edinburgh Award in the area with 110 students taking the Bronze Award alone.

In April we welcomed a huge variety of employers into the school to attend the careers fair. All students had the opportunity to visit and ask questions and many came away with new ideas for their future careers. We also welcomed residents from the local care home to enjoy afternoon tea, company and music with our students. It was a great opportunity to share stories and share a connection between the generations.

May is such a busy time for the school with external examinations starting earlier every year. I wish both Year 11 and 13 students the very best. The examinations are a huge undertaking for the school and thank you to all students as their attitude and behaviour have been exemplary. I always get nervous when looking at staff predictions, but the indications are that we are looking at some very strong results for the school again this summer, at both GCSE and A level.

Ofsted inspected the school on 8th and 9th May and the school looked excellent. Student behaviour was exemplary during the inspection and we were well supported by a strong parent and carer response to the Ofsted survey. I am expecting a draft report in the next few weeks and I look forward to sharing the full report with you at the end of June.

The building work is progressing well and we hope to have the new classrooms ready for August. We have also finalised our plans to update the sixth-form common room and create additional study facilities. Year 11 will also have its own dedicated dining room from September. All this building work will lead to some disruption in June as we will have to close some areas of the school. We are also in the process of renewing the tender for the catering contract. I will let you know the outcome and the impacts of this change in the next Swan.

Looking ahead we have futures week planned with visits to Snowdonia, Alton Towers and Chester Zoo planned. I mentioned in the last edition that the school is having to manage the budget very carefully at the moment as the amount of money we receive is falling in relative terms. To make these visits viable we are dependent on a large majority of parents and carers making voluntary contributions towards the visits. I would ask that if you are able to make a contribution please do so as this ensures that we are able to keep offering these great opportunities.

Thank you to all the staff and students who have contributed to this edition of The Swan and I hope you enjoy reading it.

I enjoyed chatting with the small group of boys, standing in the dinner queue and challenging each other to solve the puzzle. One boy had us all in awe as he readily twisted and turned the cube to completion. Personally, I never got beyond managing to complete two sides. The very same lunch time, I walked into the Dining Hall to see a group of boys playing Top Trumps. My own children had so many packs of these and they still make an appearance on camping holidays.

Our final Summer half-term will see the arrival of the mobile phone ban. Whilst some students may see this as a negative, I know many of you support this decision and welcome the new policy. My hope is that I will start to see more Rubik's cubes and Top Trumps at lunchtime, maybe alongside noses in books rather than gaming on phones and who knows, even some conversations.

We recently had a panel of eight Year 7 and Year 9 students at our Governor's Pastoral Meeting. I was pleasantly surprised to find that all students were in favour of the ban. One boy talked about some students hiding phones behind computer screens or even books whilst reading; another talked about the distraction of students wanting to 'check' phones during lessons. All agreed that a clear policy on phones will be helpful and benefit lessons. The next message was, please be consistent and make sure everyone sticks to the rules.


Why has the Government decided to ask schools to ban or heavily restrict the use of phones in schools? One in three secondary school pupils has reported that mobile phones are used in most lessons without permission.....

One in five pupils has experienced online bullying ...one in ten pupils cite making and maintaining friendships and their mental health as a cause of worry, anxiety and depression. (Mobile phones in schools - February 2024 (publishing.service.gov.uk))

As a school, we have participated in the DfE's Education for Wellbeing research programme and we agree that the removal of mobile phones from school will be of great benefit to students. My hope is that our 'never used, never seen, never heard' approach, will help and support our students to develop social skills, it will enable them to be more focused in lessons and it will help them stay safe as we reduce the opportunities for online activity.


Working closely with Helen Howell, author of 'Revision Revolution', we have listened to student and staff feedback to take steps to explicitly teach students how to revise effectively. These have included:

- Learning Habits Assemblies to all students, presented by Mrs Roberts
- Appointment of a Learning Habits Lead, Mrs O'Malley, Head of MFL
- Learning Habits Workshops for Years 11 and 13
- Year 11 Learning Habits Parent Carer guide shared with families
- Form Time Learning Habits programme delivered to students across all year groups



You can see some of the materials students are focusing on to improve their learning habits in school and how they can study at home to help with revision for topic assessments and mock exams.

We will continue to focus on building skills and revision strategies with students which should empower and build confidence in developing excellent learning habits for the future .



All form tutors started to deliver Learning Habits sessions during form time in the Summer Term.

There are 5 sessions in total, covering key areas of Learning Habits, including:

- Debunking revision (what is revision)
- Brain Dumps
- · Self-quizzing
- · Making and using flashcards
- · How we learn

Oracy Competition

Laura Yeo and I entered the Gresham College Oracy Competition, with over 400 applicants. Although, sadly, we did not win, we were kindly invited on an all-expenses paid trip to London. Ms Kippax considerately offered to join and take us. This invite included a lecture by a Professor of Astrophysics from the University of Oxford, Chris Lintott, who is also Gresham College's Professor of Astronomy.

Gresham is London's oldest Higher Education institute and was founded in 1597, they have been providing free lectures within the City of London for over 400 years.

The Kohn Award astrologist and long-time copresenter of The Sky at Night Professor Lintott gave a lecture called "It's Never Aliens" where we learnt about how astronomers discover new planets. We also learnt about different features of space and the strange phenomena that sometimes occur in stars and other galaxies. Throughout his lecture, Professor Lintott also went through the techniques he was using to deliver his speech. This was done in order to also help the audience with their oracy skills in the future.

We then spent time sightseeing around London. Firstly, we visited the British Museum, which houses over an astonishing 8 million works from all around the world. Afterwards, we walked to Garden and watched Covent а street performance by an opera singer. Then, we visited the National Portrait Museum, arguably the first national public gallery that was solely dedicated to housing portraits, where we enjoyed looking at the paintings of the Tudors, people Laura and I will be studying in History A-Level. Finally, we proceeded to Trafalgar Square, where we admired the fountain and the surroundings, amid the hustle and bustle. After a stroll by the river, it was time to head home.

Celebrating our English Teachers


As a school, we are fortunate to have some very experienced and talented teachers. We are delighted that Christleton staff have been invited to teach at our local universities.

Mrs Cutler has been teaching Sociology modules at Chester University and working with the Secondary School teacher training department visiting schools to assess how trainee teachers are performing.

Ms Kippax has also been lecturing at Chester University on the Secondary School teacher training course for English teachers. We recently hosted the trainee students for a day so that they could learn more about A-Level teaching. It is great that we have staff of this calibre and that the universities want to use their expertise



Mr Simpson is teaching Screenwriting on the Master's course at Liverpool University. His skill in creative writing has already been recognised; outside of CHS, he is a Royal Television Society Award-winning screenwriter. His TV drama, One More Unfortunate, was short-listed for the Red Planet Prize. The subsequent stage adaption was performed nationwide. His next play, Saved by the Bell Jar, was shortlisted for the Bruntwood International Prize for Playwriting and is in development with BBC Radio Drama North and the Liverpool Everyman. He has penned episodes for continuing dramas across multiple platforms and has written for Jimmy McGovern's MOVING ON for BBC1. He's written extensively for the Guardian and worked with both the Guardian and Faber on The Secret Teacher Book. Mr Simpson is currently writing for the much-acclaimed Waterloo Road (BBC1) and Hollyoaks (C4, E4) as well as working on original projects and a new, Liverpool-based Netflix drama. Our A-Level students in particular benefit from his expertise when they do the Original Writing module of A-level Language coursework.





Urban Plan Workshop

Students in Year 12 had the opportunity to take part in a five-hour Urban Plan Workshop Event which took place in early November.

This event was a great opportunity for anyone interested in a future career in Architecture, Planning, Finance, Marketing, or Environmental Management, as well as providing useful material for students of Geography (e.g. Regenerating Places) and Business Studies (e.g. Budgeting, Costs and Investment Decisions).

The 20 students involved were mostly Geography and Business Studies students but also included some other sixth former interested in these career areas. They were able to work as members of five different property development companies to create and present tender proposals for redeveloping a city centre site.

A team of facilitators and industry experts were on hand to help students understand the many complex factors, often in tension with one another, which shaped their creative and financial response to the tender brief. The event culminated with each of the five teams giving a formal presentation to a panel of industry professionals.

Year 13 Chemistry - Chester University trip

On Tuesday 26th March 2024, Year 13 Chemistry students visited Chester University to learn about and use their spectroscopy equipment. Students were able to extract, isolate and sample the components of a painkiller using Thin Layer Chromatography which allowed students to identify the main chemicals that are found in painkiller medication.

Students then got the opportunity to use the Infrared Spectrometer to produce a range of spectra which they could then use to identify unknown organic compounds. This allowed students to link this hands-on experience with their knowledge and learning from lessons.





The whole day gave students the opportunity to work in a high specification scientific laboratory and use equipment that they don't have access to in schools.



UKMT Maths Challenge

The marvellous mathematicians have been at the UKMT maths challenges again. The intermediate challenge was beaten by Esme Ward, Dewi Smalldon, and Hermes Chiang, who all achieved the best in their years and qualified for the much more challenging second round!

The award is entirely student-led, with students nominating and voting for their favourite books. The nominees this year ranged from teen drama to high-concept science fiction, sparking the interest of every type and age of reader.

Each year, the shortlist is revealed at a special inperson author event where schools are invited to attend to meet the authors and become inspired by their writing journeys. Our students had the opportunity to have their books signed by the shortlisted authors and listen to new upcoming titles from the shortlisted authors.

Most excitingly, they were able to absorb the precious words of wisdom and hard won experience from these inspiring authors. We listened avidly to their fascinating tales of inspiration and authorship. From Josh Stone, a Mental Health Nurse and author of the dark dystopian 'Happy Head', to the deeply personal tale of 'When I See Blue', inspired by the author's own experience of OCD, there truly was something for everyone and a great demonstration that a writer can both take inspiration from the world around them and create whole new worlds.



The winner of the younger age category was 'Tyger' by SF Said - a fantastical narrative set in a strange alternate world where a young boy called Adam uncovers something incredible in a rubbish dump - a mythical animal.





The winner of the older age category - to much applause and celebration - was 'Happy Head' by Josh Silver, a thrilling, thought-provoking new series set in a dystopian future far too similar to our own where there is a national crisis of teenage unhappiness. The onsite bookshop almost sold out of the eye-catching winner, with its distinctive yellow cover - even Ms Russell grabbed a copy!

We cannot wait to introduce these books to our KS3 and KS4 students, and look forward to next year with bated breath!

Sports News - The 2024 Cook Cup

You may not know that the blue statue and two benches at the front of the school were erected in memory of Tristan Cook and Dominic Arnold, two beloved year 12 students who tragically died in a car accident in 2006.

Well done to all the lads for a great game of football and for the sportsmanship you showed. An amazing final effort from both years but Year 12 took the win with a final score of 2-0




