

This term, we launched our new assessment and reporting framework: full details can be found on our website: Click here

Parents and carers will see a new style of report with, we hope, a clearer guide on student progress, in a wider range of attributes.

We have planned and started to implement our curriculum recovery programme, which focuses on four key areas:



Academic Recovery – Knowledge and Skills and is essentially department/subject based



Literacy and Numeracy – in which we are using external tutors to work with small groups of students



Wellbeing – focusing on social, emotional, cultural and fitness recovery



Special Educational Needs

I reiterate again, that our recovery programme is not a 'quick-fix'. Our strategy is geared to catch-up lost learning over a period of time and we are convinced it will achieve its aims and get students back on track on their individual learning path.

- A new Key Stage 3 curriculum has been launched in Year 7, although in English, Maths and Science, the new curriculum has been rolled out across all three Year groups.
- A new assessment and reporting framework across all Year groups, (except Years 11 and 13).
- Teaching and Learning focus on Metacognition, Retrieval practice, and Quality First teaching.
- New staff 'Learning Pods' focusing on: Trauma Informed Practice, Metacognition, Literacy and Numeracy, Gifted and talented, Retrieval practice, Feedback and marking.

New approach to home learning.

Some examples of the provisions we have put in place include:

- Benchmark recovery testing carried out on all Year groups.
- Tutoring programme in English, Maths and MFL.
- Additional Laptops purchased.
- Additional TA support for SEND recovery.
- One-to-one mentoring for identified students.
- Learning resources purchased.
- Catch-up lessons after school.
- New Well-being Co-ordinator.
- Online revision platform 'GCSE Pod' purchased.

This term we have also launched our new three year Strategic School Development Plan, (a version of which is on our website). A number of new initiatives are already under way:

Headteacher's blog

We were thrilled to finally get the approval for school to fully reopen in September. Distance learning had worked well but it was never meant to continue for longer than a term. We knew that the students needed to be back in lessons and we had to find a way to make the school as **COVID-19** safe as possible. There were concerns raised over just how safe the school would be and we had to adapt quickly to new guidance arriving daily, from the **Department for Education**.

Preparations took place throughout the summer holidays to get the site ready and staff training prepared us for everything from how to deal with a coughing student in class, to how to clean the keyboard between lessons. Given the level of prevalence within the community, we knew that we would have to respond to positive cases at some point in the Autumn term.

So how have we tried to reduce the likelihood of the spread of COVID-19 within school?

- We have reduced the movement of students around the building by creating singleclassroom bases for Key Stage 3.
- The timetable has been adapted to reduce the number of teachers having contact with students in Key Stage 3.
- Timings throughout the day are staggered for each Key Stage, to reduce potential contacts between 'bubbles'.
- Seating plans have been created, to be accessed at any time.
- We have increased school cleaning rotas, the number of hand sanitising stations and made the wearing of face masks compulsory in all communal areas.
- Less equipment is shared within school and cleaning takes place between usage of items.

These actions have so many knock-on effects such as where do students change for PE? How do we give students access to a hot lunch? What happens if it rains during a break? How do we manage examinations with limited space? Can we offer extra-curricular activities?

As a school leadership team we have never had to make so many decisions in such a short space of time.



How do we respond to a positive case in school?

- We use the guidance issued by Public Health England. All students and staff who have been
 within a two metre radius of the infected person for more than fifteen minutes, are asked to
 self-isolate for 14 days from the date of contact. The same applies to anyone who has been
 within one metre of the infected person and had face-to-face contact.
- We identify contacts using our own tracing system that used seating plans, CCTV footage and interviews with students.
- Any student displaying potential symptoms in school are sent home and asked to complete
 a test. Staff respond speedily to news of positive cases in the evenings, at weekends and
 during half term, to ensure that any contacts were identified and made aware as quickly as
 possible. All our forward planning allows this to happen effectively.

What has been the impact?

The number of confirmed cases within school has been relatively low. Quick action to isolate individuals and trace their potential contacts has been very successful in preventing the virus from spreading. We are not aware of the virus having spread from one member of the school community to another. Improved hand hygiene and the use of masks will also have had a positive impact too.

What does the future look like?

Once the vaccination process against the virus is in fully underway we are hopeful that we will be able to resume so many of the activities that the students enjoy. We have really missed the many brilliant aspects of our school life such as the school productions, extra-curricular sport, Duke of Edinburgh expeditions and school trips.

Looking to next year, I wonder what changes will become 'normal'. Will students continue to keep their hands clean? Will we retain some of the structure of the new the school day? What benefits can we take from online learning?

We are so proud of the students and how many have adapted to the changes. It is worth noting that behaviour across the school has been excellent, especially at break and lunch times. Many families have had to deal with so much uncertainty and we will always be here to support our students through, what may be a difficult year ahead for some.

I hope that from reading this, you feel reassured that we have all the procedures in place to continue to respond to the virus. Could I also say thank you on behalf of all the staff for all your messages of support throughout this challenging time.

FOR WORK AND COLLEGE PLACEMENT SUCCESS







As part of the Year 10 Learning to Work course, students have been enjoying a full day placement at Reaseheath College every Wednesday. This has given students the opportunity to experience the world of work by learning the skills of particular skilled trades and occupations which are always in demand, such as construction, animal care or motor vehicle maintenance by really getting involved in a practical area of interest.

The feedback from college tutors about the progress the students have been making has been really positive, so congratulations to all involved.

Here's what some students think about their experience so far...



"I have chosen to do the course in motor vehicles. I am interested in this because some of my family members work on cars and I loved working with them so I thought I'd go there and learn something new.

During the first week or two we started off very well. We learned about safety things. Since then I have learnt about the tyres and what the numbers and letters mean and how to take brakes off and tyres.

The PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) we have to wear is overalls and boots that have metal in them and glasses. This is because of our safety and car parts are heavy so if it falls on your feet it would break them and glasses because of acids and flying objects.

I would recommend doing this course to anyone who wants to work in a garage or start one when they are older."



"I have chosen the construction course as I find It interesting and it gives good life skills. During the first two weeks at the college, we got tours around and got to go around the zoo. Since then I have learned how to get around the college.

Also in my course I have learnt how to build a wall in an efficient way and how to stay safe in a working environment. The PPE equipment we have to wear is a hard hat, a hi-vis, toe cap shoes and overalls.

The hard hat protects your head, the hi-vis keeps you visible to others and the overalls are used to keep your clothes clean. The thing I most enjoy is at the end of the day when you get to knock the walls down! I would recommend this course to anyone who enjoy hands-on work and doesn't mind getting a bit dirty."

"I have chosen to do the course in construction. I am interested in this because I think it is a good job if I choose to do it in the future and it is very useful even if I don't. During the first week or two we started off by having a tour around the college, going through health and safety precautions and what we will be doing throughout the course. Since then I have learnt to lay bricks with and without a partner.

The PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) we have to wear is a hard hat, steel toe cap boots and a hi-vis. This is because if any bricks fall on our feet or head they will protect us and the hi-vis helps people see others better."

"I have chosen to do the course in Animal Care. I am interested in this because I love animals and I want to be able to work in a zoo when I'm older.

During the first week or two we started off by walking around the whole zoo, we saw most of the animals and we went over the safety rules. Since then I have learnt how to be aware around the animals and how to take care of them and also feed them. The PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) we have to wear is good because when it is rainy that means that we don't get our clothes wet. This is because when I have to go home then my clothes won't be wet.

The thing I enjoy the most is just being around the animals. During my time there I have got to know the safety rules and mainly what to feed the animals. Reaseheath College is good because I get to learn about what I want to do and that is animals. I would recommend doing this course to anvone who wants to work with animals."



about reptiles, mostly about snakes because I have a snake called Jeffrey so I learnt how to carry them, to see if they get ill and how to check their eyes when they shed their skin. I have learnt how to feed the animals and the parts of their bodies to check if they get ill or get hurt.

We have to wear PPE because the animals are in cages that look like their habitat so we have to wear our PPE because they might attack us or step in the wrong place. So when I finish college I am going to find a job about how to teach other people about animals or get a job at the zoo to take care of them.

The thing I most in enjoy in Reaseheath is being with the animals because I want to know how their life works, how they eat, how they take care of themselves and how they survive in the wild. I got to know how to take care of the animals so I know what food they need, how much heat they need and how to keep them safe.

After I finish High School I am going to continue at Reaseheath so I can know more about the animals so I can get a job that works with animals."



"Taking photography as an A Level has allowed me to develop as a photographic artist through expanding my knowledge and curiosity of the subject. It has given me many opportunities, including the ability to experiment with new styles and professional resources and facilities, whilst also discovering many photographers who inspire me.

In the school Christmas Card Competition 2020, we needed to independently create and edit shots that could be used on a Christmas card. For this, I took my time planning different scenes before getting the props I needed to generate my ideas. Luckily, we were given time inside of school to use the studio and equipment and entrants could each submit 2 shots. For both of mine, I explored the use of camera settings, props, lighting and viewpoints. In editing I increased the amount of bokeh as well as making slight colour adjustments to make my outcomes more appealing.

On the day of the presentations for the competition winners, we weren't initially told what was happening when we went to see Mr Jones, and thought we were going to a meeting about our past experience of GCSE Art! When we were told we had won, honestly, I was really shocked as I didn't expect to win, but I also felt a sense of achievement. For first place I won a £50 gift card and Mr Jones also said some very complimentary things about my work. I was glad I took part in this experience as it showed that working efficiently can pay off as I look forward to further opportunities to study more, and build on my existing photographic skills."


"In my opinion, A Level Photography is really enjoyable because it gives you a chance to express yourself due to the freedom you have when choosing what you want to base your personal investigation on. This is one of the reasons I would recommend taking A Level Photography.

When entering the school Christmas Card Competition, I used natural lighting coming in through the windows, a white background made from sheets of card, and I created bokeh effects using Christmas lights and a 35mm lens. After I had captured a photo I was happy with I was able to edit in Photoshop. I used the patch tool to get rid of any messy parts that my photo had, and I blurred some of them out as well so the focus wasn't too much on them.

To be honest, I wasn't really sure who was going to win the competition because all the entries I saw were of a high standard; I found it hard to decide who the winners would be. I ended up coming second in the competition and I received a £25 Amazon youcher.

When I found out I had come second, I was shocked because seeing some of the others entries made me doubtful that mine would win; because all of the entries were good, and everyone had worked hard, I am happy that Mr Jones was kind enough to buy the other entrants some chocolates. 


